EASTER *Courage*

Dear Mount Olivet Family,

I wrote the first draft of this letter on March 1. I am revising it on March 16. A lot has happened in the two intervening weeks, including the state of emergency that forced us to suspend in-person worship yesterday and all other Mount Olivet-sponsored activities for the next several weeks. By the time you read this and other articles here on April 1, even more will have happened. Yes, we live in anxious times, which means, of course, that we've never needed Easter Courage more. As we move forward, we will continue to provide updates on our website and, when necessary, through all-congregational emails. We will continue to offer resources to strengthen our faith. We will continue to marshal our resources to be a source of help and hope in our community. We will continue to pray for each other, for our health-care professionals, first-responders, and civic and community leaders. And we will continue trusting in God to help us discern how best to love our neighbor and be a witness to the courage and confidence that is ours in Christ. We will continue, that is, being the Church of Jesus Christ that is named Mount Olivet! Thank you for your continued prayers, support, and generosity. We will get through this! - **PASTOR LOSE**

It feels like there's a lot of fear in the air just now. Anxiety, fear, worry – these seem to be some of the hallmarks of our life in modern world. Yet it seems to be worse of late. Perhaps it's the specter of the spreading coronavirus. Or maybe it's the economic instability this pandemic has introduced. Or maybe it's... The list continues, as lots of forces seem to conspire against us living fear-free. And it's not simply global events that fan our fears. Perhaps it's the illness of a loved one, or the safety of a child, or the deteriorating state of an important relationship that is making you fearful. Yes, fear seems both everywhere and overwhelming of late.

There are a few verses right near the end of St. John's Easter story that help me face this fear. Mary Magdalene has gone to the tomb early Sunday morning. When she finds it empty, she runs to tell the disciples. Two of them race to the empty tomb and, not sure what to make of it, return to their homes. Mary then sees Jesus, whom she doesn't at first recognize. But when he calls her by name, she realizes she is in the presence of the Risen Lord and immediately moves to embrace him. But he says, "Do not hold on to me, because I have not yet ascended to the Father. But go to my brothers and say to them, 'I am ascending to my Father and your Father, to my God and your God.'"

What I appreciate about this exchange is how honest it is. Of course Mary wants to embrace her Lord – seeing him alive after witnessing his crucifixion is the most unexpected and joyous moment of her life. Yet the moment Mary sees him, Jesus tells Mary that she can't hold onto him, which I suspect was hard to hear. There are so many times, I think, that we wish Jesus would be a little more tangible, a little more concretely present, in our lives. "If only you were here, Jesus, and I could hold onto you, I wouldn't be so afraid," we may think.

But Jesus doesn't stop there. He also says he will be ascending to heaven to be, once again, with his Father and then adds something significant: "I am ascending to my Father and your Father, to my God and your God." We may assume that God is with us, but to the faithful Jews that made up John's original community, hearing Jesus say "my Father and your father, my God and your God" would have been astounding. God is holy and powerful and yet, Jesus asserts, also tender and compassionate. In short, Jesus wants Mary to know that God is most like a loving parent who loves her (and us!) fiercely and so will never abandon her (or us!).

Earlier in John's story, Jesus told the disciples that, once

he had ascended to heaven, he would send the Holy Spirit, which he called the comforter, advocate, guide, and defender. So while Jesus tells Mary that she can't hold onto him in this moment, it's precisely so that the Spirit can be present to all believers at all times, granting them the courage and power to move forward in faith. And, indeed, Mary finds the strength to go to the disciples, tell them "I have seen the Lord," and in this way share with them the confidence and courage of Jesus' resurrection.

So... three "take aways" from this scene when it comes to facing the fears of the day:

1) Fears are far easier to face together than alone. Mary is comforted by Jesus; she in turn comforts and encourages the other disciples. When feeling fearful, take advantage of the worship services, classes, fellowship, and service opportunities Mount Olivet has to offer – whether in person or digitally! We are stronger together – always!

2) Jesus has promised us his presence in and through the Holy Spirit. Don't be afraid to ask God for a "double-dose" of the Spirit when you are anxious. Fear is not faithless, but rather a part of the faithful life. And courage isn't the absence of fear, but rather moving forward in spite of it. Pray for courage, confidence, and compassion. They are among God's favorite gifts to give!

3) Invite others to share in the community and faith we enjoy at Mount Olivet. No one struggling with their anxiety will resent or take offense at you saying, "I feel that way sometimes, too, and when I do I find comfort at my church. Would you like to come with me?" or "My church is putting together all kinds of resources to help us get through this anxious time. Would you like to be put on our mailing list?" We are in this together, and there's no better opportunity to invite folks to share the treasure we have in our faith than through our Holy Week and Easter services and the special resources we are putting together to reach people when we can't gather.

Yes, it is an anxious time. Yet we don't have to face our fears alone as we gather together to pray for, reclaim, and share the Easter courage Jesus promises us all.

Called & Sent: John in April

In April we reach the climax of John's story about Jesus in the events that take place in Jerusalem. Throughout this season, we have the opportunity to hear Jesus' call to life and to share that call and promise with others.

April 5 is Palm Sunday and we hear of Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem. Some of the crowds that gather come in part because they saw Jesus raise Lazarus from the dead, while others come because they have heard Jesus might be the Messiah. All of which may prompt us to ask, why do we follow Jesus, and what are we looking for from him?

During **Holy Week**, we will read portions of John 18-19 (the basis of our Lenten Devotions). On Wednesday, we have opportunity to hear Theodore Dubois' *Seven Last Words*, three of which come from John's Gospel. On Thursday, we can participate in a re-enactment of the Last Supper and partake of the Lord's Supper. And on Friday we will hear of Jesus' crucifixion, which in John reveals a Jesus devoid of fear or anxiety and completely at peace with his destiny. Across this week, we might wonder with others how Jesus met his fate with such calm and how he can help us claim God's peace in our lives today.

Easter Sunday is **April the 12th** and we will celebrate our Lord's resurrection with a festival service of hymns and brass! The Gospel for this day is John's distinct account of the empty tomb. Like Mary Magdalene, we will encounter the Lord who calls us by name not just to life, but to life in all its abundance.

April 19th continues the story of the first Easter, as Jesus encounters his disciples in the upper room and not only offers them peace and forgiveness but calls and commissions them to offer the same to others. How might we, as Jesus' 21st-century disciples, continue to offer these same gifts today?

On **April 26th** we will hear the familiar story of "doubting Thomas" and also have occasion to wonder whether Thomas was doubting or simply realistic. By taking seriously Thomas' questions, we might find ourselves invited into the new life Jesus offers and wonder how we can invite others into the same faith and blessing we share.

DEVOTIONS



Now the eleven disciples went to Galilee, to the mountain to which Jesus had directed them. When they saw him, they worshipped him; but some doubted. — Matthew 28:16-17

But some doubted... This almost parenthetical phrase may well be one of the most reassuring statements to me in all of Scripture.

Steve Waldman, founder of Beliefnet.com, says “people come in droves [to religion sites on the internet] because in church they risk being seen as doubters. The Internet allows them to search in privacy.”

Mary Hull Mohr, a professor at Luther College, writes, “Most of us fear to doubt, and yet doubting is part of the search for truth. We especially fear doubt in the young, as if the questions they raise will inevitably lead them to a permanent loss of faith.” I recently met with a young man who spoke apologetically about the doubt and questions that defined his faith. He must have expected a negative reaction, because when I immediately cheered, Hooray! he was quite taken aback.

Doubt belongs not in privacy, but in community where it can be nurtured. Faith is a gift of God’s grace. In Matthew’s account of the Great Commission, Jesus says nothing about belief preceding baptism. The disciples are sent out to baptize and then to teach...in much the same way we baptize infants and pronounce to teach them about Jesus’ love and nurture them in faith.

The Risen Christ met his disciples on a mountain, a symbol of authority and authenticity in the Gospel of Matthew. And some worshipped him – it was most likely some of those who worshipped also doubted. This resurrection appearance produced not amazement, but worship... and doubt and hesitation.

But some doubted...if you are among those who doubt, be comforted that you are not alone. Don’t look to the internet to find answers, but bring your hesitations into the worshipping community of God’s people, young and old, where we can remind each other that Jesus is truly with us to the end of the age. Thanks be to God! – PASTOR MACLEAN


Thursday, April 9, *The Living Lord's Supper* – Mpls 6 & 7pm, West 7pm

In 1996 a new ministry was envisioned at Mount Olivet -- a ministry designed to be an intergenerational, faith building experience for children and families. A thread woven through all of this new ministry was service. At its heart was the conviction that service opportunities are key in teaching our children how Jesus would have us live out our faith, and that being engaged in service is an essential component of spiritual and faith development, establishing a lifelong pattern of helping those in need.

"Summer Stuff for Kool Kids" launched the new programming. It was a summer overflowing with biblically-based, service-oriented, and chocked-full-of-fun offerings for preschoolers through sixth graders including day camp adventures like Jesus to the Rescue Camp and Camp Noah's Park. Older elementary campers could opt for "Summer of Service" camps, "doing good together" at sites like St. Joseph's Home for Children and People Serving People. Designed especially for our preschoolers was Camp Read to Me, Tiny Pray and Play Camp, and more!

The ministry progressed into a plethora of programs for the congregation and community friends. "Kids Klub" insured after school fun for Mount Olivet and community kids with arts and crafts, Bible stories, gym play, and service projects. Special events on Saturdays and vacation break days found us bowling, roller skating, and visiting museums.

There were also numerous family events, including: Father/Daughter Square Dance; Mom's Magical Mystery Tour; and programming designed for single parent families. An important component of this ministry were the grandparent/grandchild events, where fun was had on Doing Service Together Days, Grandpa and Grandson Days Away and of course, the enormously beloved Grandmother and Granddaughter American Girl Tea. And

a highlight of every year (including this year!) was the oh-so-popular Gingerbread House Decorating in December, which included a birthday party for Baby Jesus.

The entire congregation got involved with the Family Advent, Lenten, and Summer Service Projects where members generously donated filled school backpacks, books for reading programs, Crisis Nursery Supplies, and clothing for victims of natural disasters. (Remember the red wagon in the narthex?)

As time went by it was extremely gratifying to witness the congregation's willingness to become involved as volunteers, a much needed component essential to the ministry's continued success. Parents, grandparents, and retired members volunteered, and, beautiful to behold, members even took vacation days to support the work. They were there for whatever was needed: table teachers at camps, field trip chaperones, and, of course, helping with setup and staying sometimes very late for cleanup.

The most touching aspect of this phenomenon was the volunteer corps that evolved out of the young children that grew up participating in the ministry. Kids whose first experience was "Camp Read to Me" as preschoolers would then end up spending their entire summer as loyal volunteers during middle and high school. Younger siblings graduated to assist just like their big brother or sister had modeled for them. The commitment of all these volunteers was and is humbling, heartwarming, and invaluable to the ministry.

The mission of Children's and Family Ministry was to establish a partnership with the families of Mount Olivet as they nurtured the spiritual development and faith formation of their children and lived out their faith together. Who knew it would turn out to be so much fun!






