Come and See What the Lord Has Done!

One of my favorite lines in Scripture comes from Psalm 46: "Come and see what the Lord has done, the amazing things God has done on the earth." It's an "anchoring verse" for me anytime of the year, a reminder that nothing is too big, too difficult, or too fearsome for the Lord to handle. But it seems especially appropriate at Easter, when we reflect on the "amazing thing" God did by raising Jesus from the grave. As the Apostle Paul liked to say, in Jesus' resurrection, God actually *defeats* death. And ever since, Christians have been invited to ponder that if God can raise Jesus from the dead, what *can't* God do?

That promise seems especially poignant these days. As I write, we are coming out of the havoc created by the Omicron variant and have just entered into the chaos and tragedy of Russia's brutal invasion of Ukraine. We are also at the beginning of a teachers' strike for fair wages and more support for kids in our community. And news outlets report almost daily spikes in anxiety and depression of people at all ages, but especially our youth. The world, just now, seems like a fearsome place.

And so in the first few weeks of April we gather once more to remember Christ's journey to Jerusalem, his Last Supper with his disciples, his betrayal, trial, crucifixion and then, on the third day, his resurrection. Why? Because these events – told in and through the songs of "The Seven Last Words of Christ," remembered in our Maundy Thursday and Good Friday services, and celebrated with trumpet and timpani on Easter – remind us that the world has *always* been a fearsome place and that God *always* comes to meet us right in the middle of what is most difficult in order to hold onto us, care for us, redeem us, and give us new life. In other words, we gather to hear of the wondrous things God has done because God isn't done doing wonderful things. And in Christ's resurrection we're invited to ask once again, if God can raise Jesus from the dead, what can't God do?

Encouraged by our worship together, we are strengthened through our faith to take on the important, and sometimes fearsome, challenges of the day in faith and courage. There are limits to what we can accomplish, of course, but trusting that God will in time redeem all things, we can do what we can in the moment to care for our neighbor and make this world a better place. We cannot erase COVID, but we can care for our community by promoting vaccines, wearing masks when necessary, even staying apart for a time in order to more quickly come together safely. We cannot end the war in Ukraine, but we can work with our partners at Lutheran World Relief to offer tangible and critical care to those who are suffering. We cannot resolve all the differences between teachers and administration, but we can make room for a hundred kids to hang out, have fun, play, and learn in a safe place in the meantime. We can't eliminate anxiety and depression, but we can remind folks of all ages, and especially our youth, that they are loved and valued.

The cover image on this month's Messenger is taken from an icon from the Orthodox Church (prevalent in Greece, Russia, and Ukraine) called the "Anastasis," which means "resurrection" in Greek. It depicts Christ's descent to the dead and what is sometimes called "the harrowing of Hell," as Jesus pulls Adam and Eve, and all those who died before he came, out of the grave and into new life. What I love about the image is how it reminds us that God is always at work to create new life, to defeat death, and to instill in all God's people courage to face the challenges of the moment confident that God is still doing wonderful things.

I have said before and will say again that I believe the world has never needed Mount Olivet more. So, as we look at the important, even fearsome, challenges of the day, let us remember that God's light shines brightest at the darkest moments, that in Christ's death we have the promise that God meets us always at the most difficult places of life, and that in Jesus' resurrection we are reminded that God's love is more powerful than hate and that God's love is more powerful even than death. Then let's ask together and again, if God can raise Jesus from the dead, what can't God do? And with that confidence in mind, let us continue to go forth, determined to do what we can, anchored by the promise that God's hand is leading us and God's love supporting us.



Seriously... What's Up with Revelation?


Are you ready for a Revelation? In May, the *Living the Message* Bible Study will focus on the last, and what is arguably the most controversial, book of the New Testament. Revelation, or the Revelation to John, is sometimes most known for its graphic visions of beasts and horsemen, angelic beings of heavenly wonder, Hell and blood and fire, a lamb, a lion, stark depictions of judgment, and symbolic language galore. A biblical theologian once quipped, "It's the book of the Bible which might most appeal to our middleschool aged members interested in gory fantasy!" Who wouldn't want to read about the ten-horned, seven-headed dragon, and the epic battle between good and evil culminating in the end of all creation?!

With all its symbolic and graphic content, interpretations of Revelation over the centuries have run the gamut. Sadly, the book has been and is still often used as a weapon of fear, a tool of greedy exploitation, and a warped commodity for spiritual abuse, promoting theologies which have little to do with the rest of scripture or the story of Jesus in the gospels. Even the most skilled and studious Biblical scholars, including the father of the Reformation, Martin Luther, have questioned whether it should have been included in the canon. At the same time, it provides some of the most well-known, comforting, beautifully artistic, and dear passages used almost universally across the ages in the worship practice of the church.

So, how shall we read it? Far be it from perhaps any person to claim to be able to answer all the questions this book conjures, but join in May to dig deeper, learn some background, and hear anew how it may finally bring good news, good encouragement, and good hope for any time.

Through his preaching and writing, Martin Luther spurred a reformation of the whole church. His beliefs - that we are justified by grace through faith, that each of us has a calling (vocation), that God uses both government and church to enrich our lives, and that God encourages and directs our lives of faith through law and gospel - shaped the sixteenth century profoundly. But... that was 500 years ago. Does Luther's theology still speak? What relevance do his convictions hold for us today? We'll address these questions by taking a page from Luther's own history. When writing his small and large catechisms, Luther would take central elements of the Christian faith - the Apostles' Creed, Ten Commandments, etc. and break them down into bite-size pieces and then ask of each one, Was ist Das? Literally "What is this?" Or, more broadly, "What does this mean?" or even "Why does this matter?" So also, we'll lift up four key elements of Luther's theology and ask "So what? Why does this still matter today?"
