Room for All!

There's an odd little story near the beginning of Luke's Gospel that has always caught my attention. It's basically a recounting of John the Baptist's preaching. As in the other three Gospels, John is a fiery preacher, announcing the coming of the Messiah and warning the people to "flee the wrath to come." What makes Luke's version different, and also a bit odd, is that he is the only one to include a response from the crowds. John the Baptist closes his sermon with these ominous words: "*Bear fruit worthy of repentance, for even now the axe is lying at the root of the trees; every tree therefore that does not bear good fruit is cut down and thrown into the fire.*" And then the crowds, far from shrinking away or getting angry at John's message, instead ask a remarkably practical question: "*What then should we do?*"

And after announcing impending judgment with some vim and vigor, John's counsel seems fairly ordinary, even mundane. As St. Luke writes, *In reply John said to them, "Whoever has two coats must share with anyone who has none; and whoever has food must do likewise." Even tax-collectors came to be baptized, and they asked him, "Teacher, what should we do?" He said to them, "Collect no more than the amount prescribed for you." Soldiers also asked him, "And we, what should we do?" He said to them, "Do not extort money from anyone by threats or false accusation, and be satisfied with your wages."*

To simplify a bit, John says, "You should share, be fair, and don't bully." All of which feels more like the stuff of Kindergarten than end-of-the-world judgment. Which may just be Luke's point. *Faithfulness does not have to be heroic.* There are opportunities to do God's will, to be God's people, all around us. These opportunities are shaped by our context: the roles in which we find ourselves and the needs of the neighbor. But make no mistake, opportunities abound. At work or at home, at school or in our places of volunteering, and certainly at church there are manifold ways by which we can offer our faithfulness to God through service to our neighbors.

Perhaps even more surprising than the content of John's ethical instruction, though, is his audience. The people he addresses are not simply ordinary, but instead are the riff raff – poor crowds with little to offer, despised tax collectors who profit from the oppression of their countrymen, mercenary soldiers known for extorting the vulnerable. Yet they are not excluded from John's attention or the possibility of "bearing fruits worthy of repentance." If this is true – if peasants, tax collectors, and mercenaries have

something to offer – then who, we might wonder, is excluded? The answer, as it turns out, is no one. John preaches to all, Jesus comes for all. In the kingdom of God on earth, there is room for all and everyone has a role to play.

At Mount Olivet, we have recently had a wonderful Easter celebration, a powerful reminder that God's love, light, and life are more powerful than all the hate, darkness, and death in the world. And in light of that promise, we are sent out with equal measures of confidence and courage to do what we can to make this world look more like God intends and to share God's love and hope with all we meet. This odd little story from Luke reminds me that we can do that wherever we are. In fact, I've always found it both interesting and instructive that John doesn't tell the tax collectors they have to quit their job and he doesn't implore the soldiers to become pacifists. Even in light of impending judgment, they are called to serve where they are. In this way, John actually makes even the most mundane elements of daily life *holy* – that is, places where God is at work in us and through us for the sake of God's children.

Luke closes his description of this scene by saying, "with many other exhortations, John proclaimed the good news to the people." Words of judgment and warning "good news"? Yes, because John gives the crowds – everyone! – a role to play in the coming kingdom. It demands neither job change nor relocation, neither religious pilgrimage nor exorbitant sacrifice. Rather, participating in God's new kingdom is available to them where they are, requiring only the modicum of faith necessary to perceive the sacred in the ordinary. It is, in short, entirely within their reach: "Share. Be fair. Don't bully."

It may not be heroic, but it is something they can do. And, when you think about it, it is something that anyone can do. Which means that it is something we can do, too. We can, that is, live out the promise of Easter each and every day wherever we are simply by paying attention to the needs of those around us and responding with hope and compassion. We all have something to contribute. We are all part of God's kingdom. Good news, indeed!

DEVOTION

"We know that all things work together for good for those who love God, who are called according to God's purpose" — Romans 8:28

Just before those words, Paul speaks of the pain, suffering, and hardships we all experience in this life. He says, "I consider that the sufferings of this present time are not worth comparing with the glory about to be revealed to us." (Romans 8:18). Paul says that in the midst of the world's suffering, in our longings, losses, and hardship, God is at work for good. But can it really be? Can we believe that God is at work for good when there is so much pain, suffering, and evil?

The Jesuit priest and writer Anthony de Mello made an extensive study of this text. He concludes that first, we humans are in no position to make final judgments on the things that happen to us. A certain event may have every appearance of being bad at the time it occurs. And yet, in the mysterious unfolding of life, who knows how the story will finally turn out?

De Mello's second conclusion was this: God is at work for good in our lives. The One who created the universe and gives us humans' great freedom to act for good or for evil, is a God who is capable of taking the worst of things and working the best out of them.

That is what Paul is saying in this passage from Romans. "We know...we believe by faith...that in everything, God works for good with those who love him, who are called according to his purposes." Paul is not saying that suffering, tragedy, and loss are in any sense good. He's saying that in our suffering and loss, God is still God. And God is always there, working for good. In the difficult times we don't always know how things are going to work out. But Paul says this is what we do know: "In all things, the seemingly good and the seemingly bad, God is at work for good." We can live in faith, hope, and confidence that God's love will triumph in the end. — PASTOR MACLEAN




