The Future is Now

About this time last year, we were calling Christmas tree farms across Minnesota. Anticipating our second annual tree-lighting, we had decided that, rather than cut down a live tree each year, we would plant one. As I shared our plans with one of our members, I acknowledged that I probably wouldn't be serving at Mount Olivet by the time the tree grew to its full height. In response, he said, "You know the best time to plant a tree?" and, after a moment's pause, continued, "Twenty years ago!"

That conversation has lingered with me ever since, as I've realized how true that is for many aspects of our life. If you want your children to enjoy a fulfilling career someday, you start investing in their education from the earliest age. If you want to be healthy and active in your later years, you need to start exercising and eating well in your middle years. If you want to retire with a measure of financial security, you start saving as soon as you can. The same is also true of our church. If we want Mount Olivet to be a strong, vibrant, and caring congregation that nurtures the faith of our children and grandchildren, we need to invest now.

Toward that end, each year in September we ask all of our members to make a commitment to fund the ministries, mission, and outreach of our church. And each year I am both grateful and mystified. The gratitude stems from the fact that we typically receive more than \$6 million dollars of pledges and gifts. That's a tremendous amount of generosity! When you combine that with revenue from some of our programs (preschool, summer camps, fees from the Conference and Retreat Center, etc.), we fund nearly 85% of our \$10M budget. The funds to cover the remaining 15% gap come from a variety of sources including the Mount Olivet Foundation (established in 1981 by Pastor Youngdahl and composed primarily of estate gifts) and non-repeatable revenue (including, this year, the sale of a house at 5000 Logan Ave.). Again, I am so grateful for the generosity of our members that makes possible the many important ministries of our congregation!

But I am also mystified. Fewer than half of Mount Olivet households actually make a gift. That's a lot of people who worship on Sundays, send their kids to Sunday School or Cathedral of the Pines, and receive the care of our pastors and staff but do not feel moved to contribute. Further, of those who give, 42% of

contributing Mount Olivet members give \$10 or less per week. I don't think this is a case of active neglect – that is, that members who give little or nothing don't care about Mount Olivet – but rather of oversight. Sometimes we assume that others will give so we don't have to. And sometimes we get so occupied with things that demand our attention that the needs of our congregation become an after-thought. Our gift to Mount Olivet comes after not just our mortgage payment or retirement savings, but also our vacation, recreation, entertainment, and more.

I believe we can do better! Moreover, I believe God wants us to do better, not just for the sake of Mount Olivet's ministries, but because there is incredible joy in being generous, in realizing and sharing our blessings, and in investing in something in which we believe.

So here are my two words to you, my dear Mount Olivet family, as we enter this Stewardship season. First and foremost, thank you! Thank you for your participation in the life of our congregation, for your prayers, for your volunteering, and for your generosity. Thank you. *You are Mount Olivet!* Second, please give intentional and prayerful thought to what you can contribute to Mount Olivet's present and future ministry. If you've not given before, try giving something. If you currently give, ask what it would take to increase your gift. In particular, ask whether your gift to Mount Olivet reflects how God has blessed you and whether what you give reflects what you receive from this church. In short, I am asking that each of us take personal responsibility for the health of our congregation. Remember, the future is now, as what we decide today regarding our stewardship will greatly determine our future.

Each of us as individuals can do some good for our church. Together, we can do something amazing. We are Mount Olivet! And before us lies the opportunity to live into God's dreams for our marvelous congregation.

SUNDAY WORSHIP IN SEPTEMBER

The scripture readings on Sundays will come from chapters 12 and 13 of Corinthians, looking at our Stewardship Bible verse this year, "Now you are the body of Christ and individually members of it" from 1 Corinthians 12:27. And this is an important verse to know!

The imagery Paul uses to help the early Christians in the city of Corinth imagine the importance of the relationships they shared with each other. The Corinthians, you see, tended to think pretty individualistically – *What does the faith mean to me? Am I getting what I need from the church?* Paul wanted to broaden their imagination so they could realize that, as those joined together by faith in the Risen Christ, each of them was intimately connected to the rest of the community. The same way all the various parts of the human body are. Our bodies are at their best when all the members function well together; so also with the Church. Paul then goes one further step to say that the individual members of the church together make up the Body of Christ. Each of us, that is, has gifts to offer, a role to play, and strengths to contribute to see God's work accomplished.

We can accomplish all that God imagines together, so join us at church on Sundays, volunteer, attend an event, all are welcome at this community of faith!



THE GOD YOU DIDN'T EXPECT: JUSTIFICATION BY GRACE!

Everyone has a picture of God. Shaped by our experience, by stories in the Bible, by the

preaching we've grown up with, these pictures are powerful. For many people - including the young Martin Luther - God was like a stern parent: loving, yes, but even more demanding, expecting the best from us but also punishing us when we fall short of those expectations. As a young monk, Luther did everything he could think of to please the God he had imagined. However, he could never escape the conviction that he had not done enough until he stumbled upon a single verse from Paul's Letter to the Romans: "For in it the righteousness of God is revealed through faith for faith; as it is written, 'The one who is righteous will live by faith." In this verse, Luther suddenly realized that it was impossible to justify ourselves (that is, to merit God's love and acceptance) and that for this reason God justifies us (that is, accepts us) by grace and out of love, a gift we receive in faith. This God who accepts us and calls us holy out of parental love was totally unexpected by Luther... and still surprises us today! So come and learn about the God who wants nothing more than the best for us, who loves us more than we can imagine, and who will never give up on us! Come and meet, that is, the Unexpected God!

FOR HEAVEN'S SAKE, GIVE IT A REST!: GOD'S RADICAL SABBATH COMMAND

Ever feel life is too busy? Or like the world races ahead and it's all we can do to keep up? Or like each day is an endless list of demands and to-dos amid the yearning and/or incessant pressure to accomplish, achieve, amass, or produce? "Remember the Sabbath day and keep it holy." We recognize this as one of God's storied 10 Commandments in scripture, but what does it really mean? Interpreted often as "going to church" and/or taking time for rest, there is a depth to be explored in this command which may be more astounding and life-changing than meets the eye.

THE RISE AND FALL OF THE AMERICAN CHRISTIAN EMPIRE?

TAUGHT BY PASTOR DIXON

In the summer of 1925, John Scopes-a substitute high school science teacher-was put on trial in Tennessee for teaching human evolution. He lost. This was the high (or low) point in the war between Christian Fundamentalism in America and modernity, and it explains more about your world today than you might guess. How has the role of the church in culture changed in your lifetime and why? How can it be that the forces that seemed overwhelmingly responsible for the growth of Christianity in America be likewise responsible for the crisis of the present moment marked by declining attendance, the mass exodus of young people from faith, and the steady growth of the "nones" (people who claim no religious affiliation)? Is Christianity in America doomed? (No.) But is American Christendom? Maybe. Join in to reflect more carefully on these questions, reexamine your experiences as Christians in 20th- and 21st-century America, and redouble your gratitude for a congregation like ours.

How are you?

We might ask and answer that question many times in a day, but how often do we really take the time to think about how we are? There's a spiritual practice called "The Daily Examen" (ask a pastor!) that helps us dig a little deeper into that question and in 12-step circles it's called a "daily inventory." Whatever it's called, taking time at the end of your day to take stock can be just what you need to stay on track with your personal goals. Here are some questions I use to aid in my own practice of daily reflection:

How was I of service to myself today?

How was I of service to others?

What did I do well?

What could I have done better?

Now, these don't need to be enormously consequential activities. For example, service to self can be as simple as recognizing that I felt tired and went to bed a little earlier. An example of what I could have done better? Perhaps I could have taken a moment before firing off a poorly worded text that led to miscommunication.

As you can see, these are not huge, mind-blowing insights about the meaning of life. Instead, they are snapshots of my day that allow me to see how my actions are lining up with my values. Your daily reflection/inventory/examen will look different, based on what composes your day and what is most valuable to you. Lastly, I like to end my daily reflection by giving thanks to God, who day after day, is always at work in me. God is at work in you, too.
