

The Rise and Fall of the American Christian Empire? Study Guide Week One: The Origins of the Church in America Pastor Dixon – April 2024

Overview

The first session of this four-week class covers the origins of the church in America from the late-seventeenth-century European background up to the Civil War. This is the broadest scope of any lesson in this series, and it will allow us to consider big questions. Why did Christianity in America take on a form so different than it had in England, Scotland, Germany, Switzerland, etc? What roots were laid in the seventeenth and eighteenth centuries that seem to still affect our experience in the church today? What was the relationship between Christianity and major historical forces and events like slavery, the development of (small "r") republicanism, and the Revolutionary and Civil Wars? This wide-ranging introduction gives us the context we'll need to attempt more focused examinations of developments around the turn of the twentieth century and the middle of the twentieth century over the next two weeks before concluding with a survey of the church in our present age.
