

The Rise and Fall of the American Christian Empire? Study Guide Week Three: The Rise of the Religious Right Pastor Dixon – April 2024

Overview

Famed American pollster George Gallup, Jr., proclaimed 1976 "the Year of the Evangelical." Both major candidates for President (the incumbent Gerald Ford and Jimmy Carter) identified as "born again" Christians, along with 34% of Americans. A little more than a generation prior, at the tail end of World War II, there were barely one million Americans represented by the newly-founded National Association of Evangelicals compared with more than 25 million members of the more liberal mainstream Federal Council of Churches, and the fundamentalist organization (American Council of Christian Churches) had only a few thousand members. What happened in those thirty intervening years? From Billy Graham's revival career to Jerry Falwell's Moral Majority, evangelicals exercised an enormous influence on American society, culture, and identity in the latter half of the twentieth century. And yet it can be hard for many Christians to talk about evangelicalism with confidence and clarity; it is so pervasive as to be unrecognizable, like water to a fish.
