

Unusual Suspects!

Moses would not have gone in the first round.

If you pay attention to the NFL, you've likely noticed how much more attention the NFL draft gets of late than in years and decades past. As in *exponentially* more. The six weeks or so between the NFL Combine – where likely graduates are scouted and evaluated on a variety of factors – and the nationally televised draft itself have become an arena for endless written and audio commentary on the prospects of various players, draft scenarios of all 32 teams, endless speculation about the draft picks themselves, and finally the predicted impact of those picks on the coming season.

While observing – and occasionally indulging in – the hype over this year's media march to the draft, I started thinking about various biblical characters, wondering how they would have stacked up if there had been a comparable "draft of the saints." And what I realized immediately is that few of them would have fared very well.

For instance, Moses – surely a candidate for the GOAT of the Old Testament – would never have gone in the first round. Or the second. In fact, if I had been a journalist on the scene, I would have predicted him to go completely undrafted. Why? Not simply because he was a murderer and fugitive (Exodus 2:12-15) – everyone deserves a second chance, right? – but rather because God drafted him to be an emissary to Pharaoh, the most powerful person in the world and... he was a self-confessed lousy speaker (Exodus 4:10)!

Other characters that most of us would think of as "all stars" were similarly unlikely suspects to fare well in such a scenario. Abraham, the one God chose to find a nation, was seventy-five and childless when God called him (Genesis 12:5). David, Israel's greatest king, was the runt-sized eighth son whose own dad considered him such an unlikely candidate to succeed that he didn't even bother calling David in from the fields when the prophet and scout Samuel came to his home (1 Samuel 16:7). Strikingly, the biblical story is so littered with unusual and unlikely candidates that most fans would have questioned God's wisdom in choosing them.

Which might be one of the important themes of the Bible: God regularly chooses ordinary, even unusual, people to do extraordinary things. Why? Three primary reasons. First, so that we know that it is *God* at work in and through God's people for the sake of the world. Second, to remind us that, with God, *anything is possible*. Third, to reinforce that all of us are God's children and therefore *all of us are candidates for God to use* to care for God's world.

On Sundays this summer, we'll be focusing on a dozen or more of those "unusual suspects" – people you'd never guess would do great things – that God chose to work through to advance God's mission. Some of them you'll know, including the aforementioned Moses, Abraham, and David, while others, like Josiah, Hannah, and Zaccheaus, may be less familiar to you. As you listen to their stories, I hope you are inspired by what God saw in them and how God worked through them to make a difference. Even more, I hope you begin to wonder about whether God might similarly choose and work through *you*.

Yes, you! Martin Luther believed strongly that two things happened when we were baptized. First, we are *named* children of God; that is, we are accepted and loved just as we are and promised God's presence all of our lives. Second, we are also *called* by God to lead lives of meaning and impact in service to our neighbors. All of us! No matter what we may think of our gifts or experiences, God thinks we have potential, wants to use us to make a difference on behalf of those around us, and plans to work through us to care for God's world.

Maybe somedays you can imagine that God wants to use you to make a difference. And maybe on other days you find it hard to believe, thinking that you are too ordinary, or that something in your past precludes you from serving, or that you don't have the "right stuff" to impact those around you. At these moments, keep in mind the long list of "unusual suspects" that God has used in the past and be encouraged – and maybe warned! – that God continues to draft the most ordinary and unlikely people to do amazing and extraordinary things. I look forward to diving into these stories with you and being surprised not only by what God has done in the past but also by what God is still doing even here, even now, and even through you and me and all of our Mount Olivet family.

Melchizedek... who?

I want to share with you one of the Unusual Suspects that didn't make the cut for this summer's preaching series.

Melchizedek. If you asked 1,000 people to name ten characters from the Bible, I'd wager Melchizedek never comes up. This guy is an obscure character. Melchizedek is mentioned three times in the entire Bible: in Genesis 14:17-24, in Psalm 110, and in the book of Hebrews. Melchizedek doesn't get a lot of play.

Most biblical scholars aren't really sure what to do with this story. Melchizedek appears on the scene as a part of a coalition of conquering armies who defeated an opposing group of armies. Apparently, Abraham and his men led the charge and were victorious so it's now time to divide the spoils of war. So Melchizedek is evidently both a priest and a king, and he offers a blessing.

Too often we limit the scope of God's blessing to the extravagant and miraculous. But God's promise to Abraham involves the totality of his life. To be sure the implications of the blessing are long lasting and far reaching, but the fruits of a relationship with God are immediate and real for Abraham. A blessing from God is the extraordinary life-giving promise of God creeping into the very ordinariness of life.

That's why reading this goofy little story about Melchizedek can be helpful. It is in and through this outsider, this priest/king that God blesses Abraham. The Most High God, as Melchizedek says, the maker of heaven and earth, meets Abraham in the ordinariness of his life and blesses him through this outsider. Walter Brueggemann, a wonderful teacher, preacher, and writer says, "More than any other in Genesis, these verses in chapter 14 invite us to take creation faith out of the arena of "origins" and see it as the source for life, buoyancy, and joy in the trials of the day."

This funny character reminds us that to be in relationship with God, is to be a person to whom and through whom God's blessings flow each and every day. We are both recipients and vehicles for the grace of God. Not because we have any particular qualifications or titles, but because God has chosen to love us and work on and through each one of us.


