The Summer of Gratitude

I have long believed that gratitude is the noblest emotion. Why? Three inter-connected reasons. First, gratitude, like love, is directed outward. When you are grateful you are suddenly not thinking at all about yourself – your wants, needs, grievances, griefs. You are focused instead on that person or thing for which you are grateful. Second, freed from self-preoccupation, gratitude affects and improves your entire outlook. The world seems better, the future more hopeful, the people around you of greater significance and value, when you are paying attention to reasons you have to be grateful. (Interestingly, I find that the more I give thanks, the more things I find for which to be grateful.) Third, in this way, gratitude creates energy and momentum. Weighed down by worry or a sense of grievance, it's hard to find the energy to move forward. But gratitude re-orients you immediately to what is possible, to what is good, to what is worth working toward.

So, with that in mind, I'm officially declaring July the beginning of a Summer of Gratitude! (Okay, so I don't honestly know if I have any authority to do that, but then again, no one has told me I can't!) I'll begin by naming a few of the things for which I'm grateful, and then invite you to do the same. So, in addition to naming my family as my chief blessing, I would share these as five current Mount Olivet-related blessings for which I am particularly grateful:

God knows that prayer is healthy and therapeutic. As Kierkegaard shared, "the function of prayer is not to influence God but rather to change the nature of the one who prays." — PASTOR KALLAND



INTERWOVEN RELATIONSHIPS

In November of 2023, I asked our college-aged members this question: "Why are young people falling away from church?" Dozens of responses later, two major themes emerged. 1) Many young people understand Christianity to be judgmental, hateful, and moralistic. It's what they've heard all their lives from the loudest Christian voices. 2) Disillusioned young people have no idea that the church down the street might be different in any meaningful way from the Christianity of the culture warriors they see on campaign trails and social media. They do not know offhand the difference between a Methodist, Presbyterian, Southern Baptist, non-denominational, or Lutheran congregation, and they have no motivation to conduct field research on Sunday mornings. And so, many (soon it will be most!) have opted simply to throw the baby out with the bathwater, so to speak.

Young people at Mount Olivet have a remarkably different experience. They have a connection to church not based on political identity, culture war loyalties, or even theological convictions, but on a variety of interwoven relationships. They have fast friendships with peers they've met at church; they have trusting relationships with their pastors and many other adults who have accompanied them on their faith journey; they have a relationship to God, whom they understand to be a loving, gracious, and abidingly faithful figure. All these relationships cultivate a sense of belonging. They have a church home.

What I have learned from our young people is that this is the only approach to faith formation that has any chance of rooting the next generation in the church. If we lead with anything other than grace (and a community that reflects and extends that grace), our kids' roots will be shallow indeed. We cannot batter and bully our kids into trusting God or loving church. Faith cannot be coerced. Our kids have taught me that, and they have taught me anew the power of the Gospel to accomplish what we cannot.

PASTOR DIXON


SUMMERTIME PLAYERS!
