Just the Beginning

It's easy for Christians to think that the main part of the biblical story ends with Easter. And certainly it is a dramatic climax. But it's not the end. In fact, in many ways, it's just the beginning.

It's just the beginning of the spread of the good news that love is stronger than hate and life is stronger than death. It's just the beginning of the message of hope that quickly spreads from Jerusalem to the four corners of the world. And it's just the beginning of the ministry and mission of the Church, a mission and ministry that stretches from Jesus' first-century disciples in the upper room to Jesus' 21st-century disciples here at Mount Olivet. And what's amazing about all these beginnings is that they were all accomplished through the words, witness, and work of a few dozen people empowered by the Holy Spirit.

Really! By the end of Luke's Gospel, there are several dozen or so women and men who have followed Jesus through his ministry, who fell away in terror during his crucifixion, who gathered in fear and trembling after his death, who were the first witnesses of the resurrection, and who were then sent to share the good news with everyone they met. And they did! So that just a few dozen people, empowered by the Holy Spirit, changed the world forever.

The story of those first disciples is told in the New Testament book *The Acts of the Apostles*, which is actually the second half of St. Luke's two-volume story about Jesus and the Church. Having followed Luke's story about Jesus (*The Gospel of Luke*) from December, we'll turn our attention this month to Luke's story about the early Church (*Acts*) for the summer. It is a thrilling story that, against all odds, the good news of the Gospel spread across the globe and is still being shared 2000 years later.

May seems like an ideal time to focus on the many beginnings Luke tells us about in Acts. It is, after all, a time of many endings and new beginnings in our own lives. Many of our students are about to end their high school career and begin their future in college, the military, or the work force – a transition we celebrate with our Baccalaureate celebrations at each campus. Choirs, confirmation, and Sunday school culminate this month and, as summer approaches, many of us will begin a period of rest and recreation with time with family, on vacation, or up at Cathedral of the Pines Camp. We draw many of the programs that run during the school year to a close,

thank our many volunteers (June 8), and begin a period of planning for exciting new events and activities for next fall. A long, cold winter is finally and fully over (I'm writing while snow is falling fast and furious in early-April!) and spring and a new growing season begins.

The question I have been thinking about as we approach a month filled with so many beginnings is both simple and far-reaching: If, as St. Luke describes, God accomplished all these new beginnings and spread a message of love and hope that changed the world through just a few dozen people, what might God do with and through the 16,000 disciples who are members of Mount Olivet?

Think about that for a moment. 16,000 Christians of all ages and a variety of experiences and backgrounds call Mount Olivet their faith home. What might happen if we devote ourselves anew to sharing the good news in word and deed? How many lives might be changed? How much love and hope might we share? How much pain and suffering might we alleviate? How many people might we encourage and support? How might we, in short, change the world again?

Sometimes it's hard to imagine God working through ordinary people like us. (Even though the Bible seems to strongly suggest that it's ordinary people God usually works through!) One thing that I've realized over the years is that God's dreams are always bigger than my own. So I would invite you to dream this May. Dream of the difference we can make together. Dream of what Mount Olivet can become as we invite friends and neighbors to share the life and fellowship we have found here. Dream of the people we might reach through our outreach ministries. And dream of the difference we can make in Minneapolis and the western suburbs through our own words, witness, and work empowered by the Holy Spirit.

And after all that dreaming... get ready for God to do even more than we'd imagined. Because... it's just the beginning!

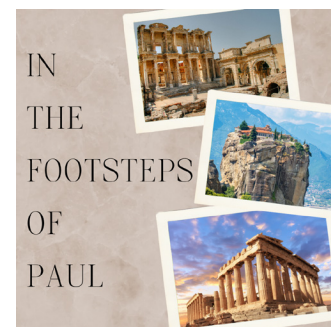

HOSPITALITY HIGHLIGHTS

Nestled within 151 acres of woods, prairie, and marshland, Mount Olivet Conference & Retreat Center offers a chance to step away from the busyness of life and experience Sabbath rest. It is a beautiful place, made truly special by the people who come here—those seeking renewal, healing, and community.

In the opening months of 2025, we welcomed over 1,700 guests from 110 different groups. Some, like the fourth graders from Prairie Creek Community School, came to learn and explore nature. Others, like mental health practitioners from Mayo Clinic, came to focus on their own well-being—something they rarely have time for while caring for others. Those who work with people experiencing homelessness and financial hardship, like Exodus Lending and Central Lutheran Church, experienced much-needed space to reflect, recharge, and gain strength for their vocations.

Our staff has offered everything from spiritual direction and nature hikes to art projects and yoga classes, from women's retreats to grief retreats, and more. Behind the scenes, our facilities team has been busy with major renovations—new roofs, updated flooring, renovated bathrooms, and even new chairs in the chapel.

We usually think of hospitality as something we offer as part of our call to love our neighbors. But Jesus reminds us that in welcoming others, we welcome him. "Just as you did it to one of the least of these who are members of my family, you did it to me." (Matthew 25:40) Through each meal served, each bed prepared, and each space made ready, we not only care for our guests—we encounter Christ himself. What a gift and a privilege it is to be part of this ministry. We hope you'll join us soon, whether you need rest and renewal or want to volunteer with us.

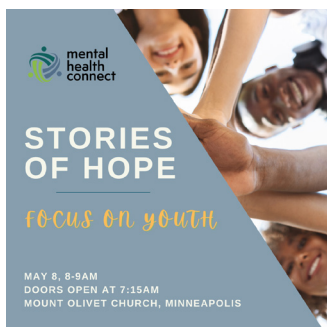
