I was surprised to learn recently that three in ten Americans read the Bible literally; that is, they read the Bible as they would a history or science textbook. Lutherans typically do not read the Bible this way, and I thought I'd share four reasons why.

1. The Bible Does Not Claim to be Inerrant.

That's right. At no place in its more than 30,000 verses does the Bible claim that it is factually accurate in terms of history, science, or geography (the technical definition of inerrancy). "Inerrant" itself is not a word found in the Bible or even known to Christian theologians for most of history. Rather, the word was coined in the middle of the 19th century as a defensive counter-measure to the increased popularity of reading the Bible in its historical context.

The verse most literalists point to is 2 Timothy 3:16: "All scripture is inspired by God and is useful for teaching, for reproof, for correction, and for training in righteousness." But one can confess that Scripture is inspired by God without resorting to claims that it contains no factual errors. We normally use the language of inspiration in just this way, describing a painting, a performance of Chopin, or even a good lecture as inspired. What binds the various and sundry texts found in the Bible together may be precisely that they are all inspired by the authors' experience of the living God.

2. Reading the Bible Literally Distorts its Witness.

While the Gospels share a similar approach in telling the story of Jesus, they vary in many details. For instance, in the Gospels of Matthew, Mark, and Luke, Jesus chases the moneychangers out of the Temple near the very end of his ministry, while in John he does the same thing but right at the beginning. When faced with this kind of inconsistency, many people do one of two things: They conclude that such discrepancies mean the Bible is not true, or they attempt to reconcile the differences by, in this case, concluding that Jesus must have chased the moneychangers out of the Temple twice (an account that none of the Gospels record).

Both of these reactions assume the primary purpose of the Bible is to record a factually and historically accurate account of Jesus' ministry. Lutherans, however, tend to think the biblical authors were less interested in history than they were in confessing their faith. From this point of view, differences among the Gospels are not troubling inconsistencies to be reconciled but rather helpful clues to understanding the confession of the author. So rather than ask "who got it right?", we might instead wonder why John describes this event differently than the other Evangelists. In this case, John is making a theological claim that Jesus is the new Passover lamb (John

1:36) and, therefore, once Jesus begins his ministry there is no need for Temple sacrifice.

3. Most Christians Across History Have Not Read the Bible Literally.

St. Augustine, for instance, came to faith later in life. An impediment to his conversion was precisely the notion that Christians took stories like Jonah spending three days in the belly of a whale literally. It was not until Ambrose, bishop of Milan, introduced Augustine to the possibility of interpreting stories metaphorically and theologically that Augustine could contemplate taking the Bible – and those who read it! – seriously. Across history, most Christians simply didn't imagine that for something to be true it had to be factually accurate, a concern only advanced after the Enlightenment. According to Martin Luther, the main purpose of the Bible was not to present history but rather to "drive Christ;" that is, express forcefully the truth that we see God's love revealed most clearly in Jesus. Similarly, Karl Barth, arguably the twentieth century's greatest theologian, once said, "I take the Bible too seriously to read it literally."

4. Reading the Bible Literally Undermines a Chief Confession About God.

Read the Bible even for a little while and you'll soon realize that most of the major characters are, shall we say, less than ideal. Abraham passes his wife off as his sister – twice! – in order to save his skin. Moses is a murderer. David sleeps around. Peter denies Jesus three times. Whatever their accomplishments, most of the "heroes of the faith" are complicated persons with feet of clay. And that's the point! The God of the Bible regularly uses ordinary people to accomplish extraordinary things. Why treat the Bible differently? In fact, reading Scripture literally turns it into an other-wordly, supernatural document that runs contrary to the biblical affirmation that God chooses ordinary vessels – "jars of clay," the Apostle Paul calls them – to bear an extraordinary message.

So if your summer reading includes the Bible, keep in mind that a) truth is bigger than fact, b) differences in the stories are helpful clues, and c) God used – and still uses! – ordinary, flawed people (including you and me!) to do amazing things.

Happy reading! And... I'll see you in Church!

STANDING WITH MORA TO SUPPORT MINNESOTA'S CHILDREN IN CRISIS

Across Minnesota, especially in Hennepin County, a quiet emergency is unfolding. Our children and teens are experiencing deep mental health distress, and far too many are being left behind. Families, desperate and afraid, turn to emergency rooms as a last resort, only to watch their children wait for weeks, sometimes months, without the specialized care they urgently need. This crisis, known as "boarding," is more than a failure of systems—it's a moral crisis.

At Mount Olivet, we choose to act. Rooted in a church community that believes in compassion with action, our affiliate Mount Olivet Rolling Acres (MORA) is leading the way by offering hope, healing, and a fierce commitment to change.

In 2024, MORA launched a bold initiative to open two Youth Crisis Stabilization Homes in Bloomington and Richfield—safe, welcoming spaces for children ages 5 to 17. These homes, opened in May 2025, provide 24/7 professional care, emotional support, and a stable environment where children can rediscover a sense of safety and self-worth. Families are also supported with tools to continue the healing journey at home.

On April 26, 2025, over 100 community members gathered for MORA's Youth Crisis Stabilization Open House, a joyful event filled with laughter, music, and heartfelt connection. Guided tours offered a glimpse into the care behind every room, and during the ribbon-cutting ceremony, Richfield Mayor Mary Supple, Bloomington Mayor Tim Busse, and Hennepin County Commissioner Debbie Goettel pledged continued partnership and praised MORA's leadership. The day was made possible by the tireless efforts of MORA staff, Crest Exteriors, Ultimate Events, and volunteers from Mount Olivet Lutheran Church, all of whom reminded us that when a community comes together with love and purpose, anything is possible.

A DAY OF HEALING: A STORY FROM BLOOMINGTON

On May 5, 2025, something extraordinary happened. MORA welcomed the very first resident into its Bloomington home, a young girl who hadn't stepped outside in over two months.

That day, she felt the sun again. She sat on the patio for hours, the breeze on her face, the warmth of the sun like a long-lost friend. For the first time in a long time, she was free—to breathe, to feel, to simply be.

Inside, healing continued. Her own room. A soft couch. A table set just for her. A space that said: You are safe. You matter. You belong. After weeks in a cold ER, every small comfort became a profound act of restoration.

This is the soul of MORA's mission: to restore dignity where it's been stripped away, to offer peace where there's been chaos, and to remind every child that they are not forgotten.

TOGETHER, WE HEAL

The opening of these homes is a triumph—and just the beginning. MORA plans to open more homes in 2026. With your support, we can ensure no child in crisis is left without care or hope.



I hope *Inspired* has been a lovely companion for you at the lake, the cabin, or on the porch. Held Evans has a gift for bringing these stories to life in beautiful ways. The thing I appreciate most about her is how she doesn't provide clear and all-knowing answers to the big topics in the Bible. Instead, she models for us how to faithfully read scripture through asking questions, learning context, and reading every story through the lens of our unconditionally loving God.



With this in mind, here are some questions to ponder as you finish reading:

- Did any of Held Evan's retellings (the stories of Hagar, Job, Peter, etc.) shift how you view those biblical characters? Did you relate to any of their stories?
- How does her approach to reading the Bible challenge or affirm the way you've been taught to read the Bible?
- What role does doubt and curiosity play in your life of faith?
- Is there a part of the Bible you've avoided or been confused by? What would it look like to revisit it now?

As we move out of summer and into the fall, I invite you to discern how you might more deeply engage this library we call the Bible. Maybe it's watching Gospel Unplugged or attending the *Living the Message* monthly studies. It could be sitting with a single passage for a week to see what sticks out to you. Perhaps (hopefully!) it's committing to attending worship on a regular basis, which happens to be the community in which we're called to read and wrestle with this holy scripture together!

However you decide to explore these sacred pages, may you continue to be drawn into the ever mysterious, beautiful, and surprising story of God and God's people—a story that continues with you!
