Called for Good!

Do you feel called?

Don't rush to answer this question. And, while you're thinking, I'll share why I'm asking. Martin Luther's sense of vocation – the belief that God calls each one of us to help make the world better – has always been incredibly important to me. And, to be clear, Luther believed this call ("vocation" comes from the Latin word *vocare*, meaning "to call") comes to us at every stage and place of our lives – in our jobs, in our relationships, in our volunteering, in our roles as citizens and neighbors, and more. Wherever we are, God can work through us to make the world better, more trustworthy, more kind. And not only *can* God work through us, but God *wants* to, *intends* to, *hopes* to. Hence, God *calls* us. This sense of calling can lend a sense of importance and meaning, even holiness, to all of our tasks, roles, and responsibilities. I've always thought that's pretty cool!

Little wonder, then, that in 2008, while I was a professor at Luther Seminary, I was thrilled to lead a Lilly Endowment-funded, nation-wide study of vocation that involved five different seminaries from five different Christian traditions. Early research was promising, as graduates from all five seminaries reported that "vocation" was a central theological category in their preaching and teaching. But then things got confusing. When we polled the congregation members, we learned that very few of them actually felt called... even though their pastors reported emphasizing vocation. And then things got not just confusing but downright depressing, as through individual interviews we realized that not only did most people not feel called, they often found little meaning in their day-to-day work and lives and struggled to see God as present and active outside their congregational life.

These interviews reminded me of a study where researchers set up shop in a restaurant right beside the New York Metropolitan Museum. This particular restaurant, like many restaurants you and I have dined at, had artwork from local artists hanging on the walls. For two weeks, researchers catalogued how much time the patrons of the restaurant – many of whom had spent the morning at the Met – looked at the paintings on the wall. Then the researchers borrowed some of the priceless paintings from the Met and hung them on the restaurant walls and for two more weeks tracked how often diners look at the art. And... there was no difference. Though just at a museum to see beautiful paintings, the diners did not look at

the priceless artwork immediately in front of them. The researchers concluded that we haven't trained people to expect to see beautiful art anywhere other than in a museum. After our interviews related to vocation, I wondered if something similar had happened at church. Had we trained people only to see and experience God when surrounded by stained glass windows and organ music?

All of this is why I asked: do you feel called? Do you believe God is at work through your roles as parent, sibling, child and friend, employer or employee, volunteer, citizen or community member to make the world more trustworthy? Can you see and sense God active in your life and activities, working through you for the good of your neighbors and community? If you do, wonderful! I hope that sense grows. If you do not, do not feel bad; that means we pastors have not done our job well enough! And if this question and thought is new to you, then I hope we can help you sense God at work in and through you.

This fall we are beginning a focused effort to lift up our multiple vocations – the various roles and responsibilities we have – as arenas in which to sense God actively working through us to care for those around us. And we want to focus on Mount Olivet's call – you guessed it! – to strengthen your own sense of call. Towards this end, and as our central Stewardship theme this year, we will highlight how Mount Olivet helps you sense God's presence in your life, not just on Sundays, but every day of the week. Because, at the end of the day, we all – as individuals and as a congregation – are called for good. Always.

So... do you feel called? Answer that question now, and let your answer shape what you look forward to this fall as we invite you to grow in your faith, grow in your sense of God's presence in your life, and grow in your commitment to this place we call home, a place that has been sharing and responding to God's call for more than a century.

THANKSGIVING AND GENEROSITY: A POWERFUL COMBO!

In 1636, Lutheran Pastor Martin Rinckart wrote the words to one of my favorite hymns, *Now Thank We All Our God*. He wrote this hymn of gratitude during the plague and while officiating at up to 50 funerals a day, including one for his wife, and in a year when he performed more than 4,000 funerals. I've always been stunned at how he could offer that much pastoral support, let alone give thanks while doing so. Until, that is, I read a recent article about how thanksgiving and generosity can reduce stress, improve mood, boost self-esteem, and even strengthen the immune system. When we meet unexpected obstacles or major challenges, many of us instinctively try to take cover or, if we can't avoid them, complain about the challenges in front of us. Pastor Rinckart went another direction. He gave thanks, not for the obstacle itself, but rather for the opportunity to serve. Ultimately, Pastor Rinckart's act of thanksgiving enabled him, strengthened him, and equipped him to give himself faithfully and generously to those who so needed him during the most trying of circumstances.

So what is challenging for you just now? What seems unusually unfair or difficult? While I won't ask you to give thanks for whatever it is that you are contending with, I will ask you to give thanks for the opportunity to serve and for the countless other blessings in your life. Then, I'll ask you to take it one step further and be generous to another person. In fact, I'll ask you to consciously do one generous act each day throughout this month: help someone who doesn't expect it, pick up the coffee or lunch tab for a colleague, visit someone you suspect is lonely, make a donation to your favorite charity, write a thank-you note to someone for a kindness they offered you, and so forth. Pay attention to how these acts of thanksgiving and generosity affect the people who receive them, but also pay attention to how they affect you. You might be surprised by the powerful combination of thanksgiving and generosity! DAVID J. LOSE, Senior Pastor

DID YOU KNOW... WHAT "BAPTISMAL FONT" MEANS?

There have been a lot of baptisms at the church as of late. Did you know that the word "font" – as in "baptismal font" – comes from a Latin word that can mean waters, spring, or source (as in the source of a river). Those multiple and related meanings are important as we bring children to the font, immersing them in the waters of baptism that hold the promise that God will cover them in God's love forever. Also in Latin the word "baptism" comes from another Latin word that means "to cover."

While most will not remember the promises spoken to them at their baptism, those promises remain the source of our confidence and trust in God. After all, we baptize infants to remind each other that God doesn't wait for us to prove ourselves worthy of God's love. God doesn't stand by until we are old enough to make a decision. God doesn't even tarry long enough for us to understand all that is happening. Rather, and just like every loving parent, God scoops us up in baptism, showers us with forgiveness, covers us in love, and promises to hold onto us forever.

So the next time you are at worship and there is a baptism, think about God's promises to you, promises that were made when you were just a baby and honored throughout your life.

STAINED-GLASS WINDOW UPDATE

The next time you're at the Minneapolis Campus, look up at the stained-glass windows running down both sides of the sanctuary. By August, the restoration is expected to be done. They are simply stunning, with brilliant colors that help tell the stories of major figures throughout the Bible. As you may remember, this was an unexpected and emergency expense as the windows were soon reaching a point where they would not be able to be repaired.

Thanks to all those who have contributed. We are nearing our goal of covering the \$300,000 unbudgeted expense of restoring the beautiful stained-glass windows. At the beginning of summer, we received a \$100,000 gift to serve as a 1:1 match. More recently, another family offered an additional \$50,000 1:1 match, which means that simply by reaching these matching goals, we will hit our target.

So far, and including these gifts, we are at \$250,000. Can you help us close out our goal by the end of the month? Thank you! You — and generations to come — will enjoy these beautiful windows and the stories of faith and courage they tell!



CELEBRATING SUMMER SUNDAYS & MINNEAPOLIS CRISIS NURSERY

In 1990 Bethlehem Lutheran Church, our neighbor in South Minneapolis, approached the Minneapolis Park and Recreation Board to offer a Sunday worship service and picnic. The next year, this service expanded into three services, and by the third year, 10-15 neighborhood churches joined the fun, each one leading a Sunday worship service beginning on Memorial Day Weekend and ending on Labor Day Weekend. These services are known as **Celebrating Summer Sundays** and have become a beacon of hope and outreach for the Minneapolis community.

Mount Olivet led worship on June 1 this year. The Cathedral Choir showed up with close to 100 high school students helping to lead the service. It was remarkable!

The Minneapolis Crisis Nursery receives the loose-change offerings gathered throughout the summer. In addition to monetary donations, the Minneapolis Crisis Nursery thrives through the volunteer efforts of local churches and neighbors.

Starting this fall, Mount Olivet is partnering with the Minneapolis Crisis Nursery to provide meals for the little ones facing food insecurity through the Nursery's **Cook for Kids** volunteer opportunity.
