Called to Be Salt and Light

And Jesus said, "You are the salt of the earth; but if salt has lost its taste, how can its saltiness be restored? It is no longer good for anything, but is thrown out and trampled under foot. You are the light of the world. A city built on a hill cannot be hidden. No one after lighting a lamp puts it under the bushel basket, but on the lampstand, and it gives light to all in the house. In the same way, let your light shine before others, so that they may see your good works and give glory to your Father in heaven." – Matthew 5:13-16

Salt and light. These may be two of the better-known images from Scripture. Jesus is sharing with his disciples what they are called to be. Salt preserves and purifies, light illumines and reveals. Together, they are essential for a whole and healthy life. I believe that Jesus continues to call his disciples to be salt and light, preserving, protecting, and enhancing life for ourselves and, especially, for those around us.

You might not be surprised that this brings me back to Luther's understanding of vocation! (From the Latin *vocare*, to call.) This fall, we have focused primarily on our individual callings – the roles we get to play as parent or child, at work and in our volunteering, as citizens and neighbors. God calls each of us to look out for our neighbor and to make the world more trustworthy wherever we find ourselves.

God also calls us as a congregation, and Mount Olivet has a wonderful tradition of responding to our neighbors' needs in a variety of ways and especially through our Affiliated Ministries: Rolling Acres, Mount Olivet Home and Careview Home, Day Services, our Counseling Center, the Conference & Retreat Center, Cathedral of the Pines Camp, and the School of Music & the Arts. Each of these was started at a particular time to respond to a particular need. (This is the hope behind the idea to transform the 1700 Chapel into a community gathering place as well.)


Of late, I've been thinking about how else we can be "salt and light" in our community at this time and place. One thing that keeps coming to mind is by offering an alternative to the prevailing divisive political discourse and landscape by continuing to be a place where people across the political spectrum come together unified in a desire to worship our Lord and serve our neighbor. I say "continuing" because I believe this is one of the key elements of our heritage. While other congregations got caught up in theological debates or "worship wars," during a time when congregations moved toward and identified with one political ideology or another, Pastors Reuben and Paul Youngdahl kept the focus of Mount Olivet on proclaiming the good news of Jesus, fostering genuine Christian relationships of care, and taking care of those around us.

At this politically divisive moment in history, the task of speaking to the concrete realities and issues of our day without being pulled into partisan loyalties and culture wars can feel daunting. But I think it has never been more important and we are committed to continuing to honor our tradition of being a place of salt and light... for everyone!

Toward that end, I want to share several commitments your pastors strive to honor. First, we are committed to lifting up and focusing on the good news of God's love for all. In our preaching, teaching, across the board. Second, and similarly, we are committed to looking at everything through the lens of the Gospel - that is, how do we believe God's love for us and all the world informs any opportunity or challenge or issue that may be in front of us? Third, we pastors are also people and citizens and have our own views on the issues of the day and, like you, we strive to understand and address them through our faith. At the same time, in our role as pastors, we are committed to preaching, teaching, and leading in a way that makes everyone feel a part of Mount Olivet and does not give anyone reason to wonder whether they and their perspectives are welcome. We are not perfect people, so we will not do this perfectly. But we will try and, when we fall short, we will confess with you our sins and receive with you God's forgiveness.

We are called to be salt and light. At times, that can be hard. At others, that can be wonderful. At all times, it is rewarding. Faithfulness always is. Thank you for your commitment to this vision, your prayers for our church, your generosity of spirit, and your commitment to helping us answer God's call.

UPDATE ON SECURITY MEASURES AT MOUNT OLIVET

To ensure that Mount Olivet remains a safe environment for all members, visitors, preschool families and staff, we have reviewed current security practices at both campuses. The current security practices at the West Campus continue to be sufficient. At Minneapolis, we are making the following changes regarding our day-to-day operations, effective November 1.

SUNDAY MORNINGS:

All doors will remain open with the exception of door #7 (facing 50th St, near the James Ave. corner), which will always be locked.

In addition to the police directing traffic in the street between services, they will patrol the perimeter of the building during services.

We will continue to have plain clothed security officers patrolling on the inside of the building all morning.

DAILY:

Door #3 (on the southwest corner of the building, outside our reception area) will be the single door open and the primary entrance and exit during business hours. We will open other doors when we have funerals, weddings, and all-congregational events, providing access to the doors off the parking lot.

When doors are locked, we will have clear signage directing people to the proper door.

We are fortunate to have a long-term partnership with the Minneapolis Police who have assisted us in reviewing our security measures and developing these plans, and their presence directing traffic brings us another layer of security. Additionally, we have recently installed 53 cameras both inside and outside our facility in Minneapolis. We will continue to review our processes and appreciate your patience and flexibility as we strive to ensure Mount Olivet remains a safe and inviting place.

"I thank my God every time I remember you, constantly praying with joy in every one of my prayers for all of you." —Philippians 1:3

Pastor Hammersten and I recently accompanied a group of 25 Mount Olivet women to the Camino de Santiago in Spain. We made our journey by foot from the town of Sarria to the Cathedral of St. James in Compostela. We took many steps - physically, spiritually, and with one another. With each step, new learnings emerged, new graces were received, and new gratitude was discovered.



One day, as I entered a city after walking 16 miles, I passed two people waiting for the bus. They kindly waved at me and said, "Hi!" Then, they quickly followed it with, "Thank you!" I smiled and wondered what they were thanking me for. And then I realized they were probably native Spanish speakers who simply wanted to connect with me in English. Two greetings they had likely heard more than any other were "hello" and "thank you."

Then it dawned on me—greeting and gratitude are at the heart of what unites us all. They are the most consistent reminders of God's love for us and the world.

The apostle Paul begins each of his letters to the early church with words of greeting and gratitude. In Philippians, he writes, "I thank my God every time I remember you, constantly praying with joy in every one of my prayers for all of you."

In November, we celebrate Thanksgiving, but as followers of Christ, we recognize gratitude is central to our everyday existence. May you know that we pastors are grateful for you and think of you with joy in our prayers. Thanks for being part of Mount Olivet, and for sharing the gospel of Jesus Christ so clearly.

Dear God, We thank you for the gift of one another. Help us to greet one another with grace and gratitude in all we do. In Jesus' name, Amen.

JOHN 11 - LAZARUS JUST LAID THERE TAUGHT BY PASTOR DIXON

Tuesday, November 4, 6:30-7:30pm, West Rehearsal Hall

Lazarus was dead—truly dead. Otherwise, this story is either boring or absurd. If he were only partially dead, Jesus just woke someone up. That's easier to accept. If Lazarus was only halfway gone, maybe we are too—partially alive, capable of saving ourselves. But I love this story



because Lazarus was fully dead. That's comforting. Even if I'm stone-cold dead, Jesus is trustworthy and loving enough to hold me. There's no "too late" for him. This story quiets our fears about loved ones—or ourselves—not being "Christian enough." Jesus's grace reaches beyond our efforts. He saves. Collaboration not required.

ESTHER 1, 4 - VASHTI AND ESTHER: FOR SUCH A TIME AS THIS TAUGHT BY REV. DR. THERESA LATINI

Tuesday, December 2, 6:30-7:30pm, Mpls Campus Room 207

The Book of Esther introduces us to two ancient queens living under the shadow of a tyrannical empire. Queen Vashti, remembered briefly, refused to be humiliated and objectified by the king's drunken court. Her bold "no" cost her dearly, yet it was also a resounding "yes" to dignity and righteousness. Queen Esther, stepping into a precarious position after Vashti's disappearance, risked everything to save her people from destruction. With courage and wisdom, she spoke truth to power in a way that changed history for the Jewish people.

Usually, Esther is celebrated and Vashti forgotten. But when we hold their stories together, we see two women—different in their circumstances, yet both faithful—who show us what it means to live with integrity and courage.

In seasons when God seems hidden or absent, the witness of Vashti and Esther can become a beacon of light. Their stories have been that for me personally, encouraging me to say "no" when others' safety and dignity are at stake, and to risk a faithful "yes" when God calls me into difficult places. Together we will seek inspiration and encouragement from their stories in order to live with dignity, courage, and faith "for such a time as this."

WHERE GOD HEALS AND NATURE RENEWS

Mount Olivet Conference & Retreat Center is a sacred place set apart from daily demands—inviting stillness, solitude, and deep rest. Surrounded by woods, rolling prairie, lake, and marsh, guests are immersed in nature's restorative rhythms. Here, time slows, the woods breathe, and healing happens: a quiet path, a marsh walk, a pause at the outdoor chapel or labyrinth. In this place, community is built not by busyness but by listening, conversation, shared meals, and mutual care—preparing people and groups to live more faithfully in the world. Spiritually renewing, this is a place where one might come like Elijah—worn down by conflicts and struggles—to simply rest, eat, sleep, listen, and recover perspective.

Each year, we host over 7,500 people and 350 groups from churches, nonprofits, businesses, and families. Our signature Summer Midweeks continue as a beloved tradition: a Wednesday evening meal, nature talk, and worship led by Mount Olivet pastors. This past summer we saw our largest crowds in many years, gathered in a spirit of welcome beneath vibrant blooms and with the expansive view from the chapel down to Chub Lake. The worship music—soloists, pianist, cellist and more—lifted hearts, evoking awe and gratitude.

We're delighted to offer Nature Education Days for K–8 students (experiencing gardens, our honeybees, the marsh ecology, composting, and pollinators); Outdoor Adventures Camp for middle schoolers and Nature Camp for children; and complimentary retreats for at-risk youth and families in need. Each of these furthers our calling: to sustain spiritual renewal, foster caring community, and send people back out refreshed to live out their vocations in daily life.
