Celebrating and Sharing God's Light

When a child is baptized at Mount Olivet, we present the parents of the child with a lighted candle and, as we do so, we often share two biblical verses about light, both of which have been coming to mind as we enter this Advent and Christmas season. The first Bible verse comes from the "prologue," or introduction, of the Gospel according to St. John that we'll be reading throughout Advent on Sundays and that serves as the basis of our Advent Devotions.

John begins his Gospel by echoing Genesis: "In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God and the Word was God." And then, because no single metaphor is adequate to the task of capturing Jesus' significance, John shifts from describing Jesus as the Word to describing him as life and then, shifting once more, as light: "What has come into being in him was life," John writes, "and the life was the light of all people." And then comes the verse we recite at baptisms, a verse that I have been holding onto of late or, really, a verse that has been holding onto me: "And the light shines on in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it" (John 1:5).

I love that verse because of how it reminds me that no matter how dark things may seem, the light of God's love and life will prevail. And, let's admit it, there is plenty of darkness these days. The tragedy at Annunciation, the political violence in our own community and across the country, divisiveness at home and turmoil abroad, the uncertainty of government services and policies, and more. It's... a lot. And that doesn't include whatever personal moments of darkness with which you may be contending – illness or loss, an uncertain future or fraught relationships. Yes, there is plenty of darkness.

Yet John reminds us that although there will always be darkness, God's light shines on. It simply will not be defeated. That's the promise of Christmas, when God comes to us as one of us. Or, as John writes, when "the Word became flesh and dwelt among us" (John 1:14). That promise is deepened at Good Friday when we see in Jesus' cross just how deeply God identifies with us, enduring suffering, shame, loss and, ultimately death. And that promise is finally kept on Easter, when Jesus is raised from the dead, promising that God's love is stronger than hate and God's life is stronger than death. Yes, there is darkness. In the world, in our lives, in ourselves. Yet the light shines on.

The second verse we recite as we give a lighted candle to baptismal parents is from Matthew and comes near the beginning of the Sermon on the Mount, when Jesus says, "Let your light shine before others, so that they may see your good works and give glory to your Father in heaven" (5:16). I love the way this verse reminds us that light and love are meant to be shared and, when shared, multiply. As it turns out, one of the best ways to dispel the darkness is to share God's light.

You are invited to do that in a variety of ways this Advent and Christmas season. You can join us for regular Sunday worship, of course, as well as for special events like the Lutefisk Dinner, the Messiah Sing-Along, our Tree Lighting, the Christmas Concert, and festive Christmas Eve worship. Each time we gather together, we encourage each other by our presence and words and let God's light shine. We can let God's light shine through our Christmas offering, too, a portion of which will benefit our longtime partner Community Emergency Services (CES) at a time when those services have never been needed more. (Read more about the great work of CES on page 4.) And there are plenty of other worthy charities and volunteer activities through which you can help others and, as you share God's light, be encouraged yourself.

We share the baptismal candle with parents hoping they will light it on each anniversary of their child's baptism, reminding their child of God's love, of God's pledge of acceptance and life, and of the promise that light is stronger than darkness. That promise is also always an invitation to join the light, to share it, to watch as it multiplies and grows, and in all these ways, shines on in the darkness.

I look forward to seeing you at church many times this Advent and Christmas season, each time celebrating and sharing God's light.



SHARING GOD'S LIGHT AND LOVE

One of my favorite verses in Scripture is John 1:14. After describing Jesus as God's eternal and life-giving Word in the opening verses of his Gospel, John then says in verse 14: "And the Word became flesh and dwelt among us." That is, God in Jesus took on our mortal, vulnerable lives to identify fully with us. That same verse is translated in *The Message* as, "The Word became flesh and blood and moved into the neighborhood," reminding us that the whole point of the Incarnation, the festival we celebrate at Christmas, is that God knows us, gets us, became one of us, and drew close to us in the baby Jesus, all in order to let us know just how much God loves us.

No wonder, then, that Christmas is a time when we turn our thoughts to the needs of others. Filled by God's love, we naturally share that love with others. In addition to continuing to sponsor our Thursday drive-through Community Meal—which to date has shared more than a quarter million meals with neighbors—this fall and winter Mount Olivet is focusing on sharing God's love with and through two local partner organizations, and I want to tell you about each below.

ANNUNCIATION CHURCH AND SCHOOL

Since the morning of August 27, Mount Olivet has been supporting our friends, members, and neighbors at Annunciation Church and School in a variety of ways, including offering support groups for families, teachers, and first responders; sponsoring trauma recovery counseling; and facilitating space and services from counselors throughout the Twin Cities for Annunciation families and teachers. This fall, we also collected donations from Mount Olivet members to support Annunciation's recovery and delivered a check for \$60,000 to The Annunciation Hope and Healing Fund. These gifts will be used to provide financial support for the needs of the church and school and to provide help to those affected by the tragedy.



Our efforts to support our neighbors will not end soon, as the needs for support, care, and encouragement – especially during the holiday season – will only grow. Thank you for your generosity, prayers, and love. As the signs at Mount Olivet and so many other places in our neighborhood say, "Our hearts are with Annunciation."

COMMUNITY EMERGENCY SERVICES

Every year, Community Emergency Service (CES) provides food, care, and support to thousands of our neighbors. Founded with support from Mount Olivet 50 years ago, CES is located in the Phillips neighborhood — one of the poorest communities in the Twin Cities — and operates one of the largest food shelves in the area. In a recent statewide survey, CES was recognized for having the lowest-cost model for delivering food to those in need, just \$0.23 per pound, compared to the state average of \$1.41 per pound. CES also provides two to three times more food per visit than the average food shelf (40 lbs vs. 14–18 lbs) and allows clients to visit multiple times per month, rather than just once. Much of its food supply is rescued from grocery stores across the Twin Cities area which supports its low-cost model and abundance of food for neighbors.

Last year, Mount Olivet gave CES \$36,000 to purchase their first set of "food lockers," an innovative way to meet essential food needs 24/7. This year, we plan to allocate \$50,000 from our Christmas gifts to help CES purchase a second set of lockers, refurbish their central food shelf, expand their ministry to assist students in need that are studying at the University of Minnesota, and strengthen their meals-on-wheels outreach to seniors. These funds are critical to continuing to help CES be "best in class" in sharing God's love with our neighbors most in need.

YOUR PASTORS' FAVORITE CHRISTMAS SONGS














It's just not Christmas in our home until we play The Chieftain's Christmas album, *The Bells of Dublin*. The Chieftains are a six-time Grammy Award-winning Irish folk band named by their government as "Ireland's Musical Ambassadors." I was first introduced to their music through their Christmas album, a gift from one of my brothers who said simply, "You're going to love it." And I did. All of the songs are built around uilleann pipes (bagpipes), the bodhran (drum), and plaintive vocals. The album includes some Christmas classics like "I Saw Three Ships" and "O Holy Night," as well as traditional Irish carols. It also features various vocal guests including Elvis Costello, Burgess Meredith (narrating), Rickie Lee Jones, and Jackson Brown. It's Jackson Brown's singing of "The Rebel Jesus" that may just be my favorite. It's sung from the point of view of a skeptic, who wonders whether the Church has missed the true point of Christmas by focusing on gifts and tinsel instead of the rebellious and expansive love of Jesus. Moving, challenging, haunting, beautiful. I can't wait to hear it again!—Pastor Lose

When I think about getting into the Christmas Spirit, Nat King Cole singing *The Christmas Song* sets the mood. Originally recorded in 1946, his rich baritone and perfect pitch voice brings comfort and warmth. It's calming. It's smooth. It's a holiday classic. "Jack Frost nipping at your nose, folks dressed up like Eskimos." Yes, I appreciate cold weather. And who doesn't like mistletoe. And Nat even offers a simple phrase, to kids from one to ninety-two, "Merry Christmas to you." Another favorite of mine is from Kenny Loggins. He sings a meaningful song about the joy of coming home to celebrate. It hints at homesickness and a need to belong. The Christmas season makes you want to go to familiar surroundings and people. Perhaps the singer is on a journey and feels a bit lost. There is a hint at a desire for comfort and a return to a simpler self. It might just be me, but the song has a way of asking for a warm welcome and a need to be remembered by our loved ones. **–Pastor Kalland**

Be the Helper: Tapping into Your Human Resilience

In the wake of learning about violence or tragedy, Mr. Rogers recalled how his mom used to tell him: "look for the helpers—you will always find people who are helping." Just as quickly as the morning of August 27, 2025, unfolded at Annunciation School and Church, we immediately saw these helpers. The teachers, students, parents, community members, first responders, law enforcement, chaplains, strangers, and more who were at the scene. There were incredible outpourings of support and selflessness at what seemed like every turn—from the very public helpers like skilled medical teams performing life-saving measures to the quieter, more private helpers who dropped meals and flowers, sent messages, and whispered prayers.

As a psychologist, an important part of my job is to support clients in times of grief. We talk about how grief is often a reflection of the relationship that's been lost. When we love deeply, we similarly grieve deeply. The horror and devastation that has been experienced during and following the Annunciation event has similarly been met with an influx of unconditional love, support, and generosity. Traumatic experiences shake us at our core and leave us questioning so much. And yet almost always, they are paired with this astounding human goodness. While this can be a challenging juxtaposition to wrap our heads around, it's the exact thing humans need in these dark hours. It's what provides hope, light, and baby steps of healing.

The term "post-traumatic growth" was first coined by researchers Richard Tedeschi and Lawrence Calhoun in 1995, formally defining a phenomenon that humans have likely been experiencing in some capacity for most of time. Tedeschi and Calhoun wrote about how, following challenging and trying life circumstances, many people go on to experience positive and life-giving psychological changes in their lives in some way. They identified five different areas where this growth tends to happen: increased awareness of one's personal strength, greater appreciation in and for life, positive changes in relationships, greater sense of openness to life's possibilities, and deeper spiritual connection. These changes don't happen immediately, of course, but are rather things that can grow over time and with adequate healing and support. Traumatic experiences unquestionably shape us and, while painful, some of that can also be for good. They can prompt us to intentionally seek out jobs, relationships, or opportunities that more deeply resonate with our lived experiences and values. They can strip down the clutter of life and allow us to focus more on what truly matters. They can allow us to understand one another in more intimate, compassionate, and connecting ways. They can shift our own understanding of ourselves to one of resilience and empowerment.

Traumatic and challenging life experiences are never things that people ask for, expect, or welcome. In fact, it's quite the opposite. However, they are often a part of our life stories. So, seek out the support you need first and foremost, so that you can begin to heal in whatever way feels best to you. Then, continue to be impacted by the experiences that have shaken you, our community, and beyond. Be impacted so that the resilience of your human spirit can surface and do good. Be open to your own version of post-traumatic growth and how it can enrich your life and the lives of those around you. And finally, continue to look for, acknowledge, and be the helper.

GENESIS 1 & ISAIAH 40 WHEN EVERYTHING IS LOST: EXILE AND CREATION

TAUGHT BY PASTOR GRANGAARD

What would you hold onto when you've lost everything? What would you want to remember and pass on to the next generation? How would you keep going amid unspeakable loss? What is the power of hope?

The exile was a time marked with violence, loss, and grief. Jerusalem was destroyed. The people were captured and carried away. How would they build a life from the rubble of the past? How would they survive? By remembering who they were. Where they came from. And who created them.

Our Genesis story, which is found in Genesis 1–*In the beginning when God created the heavens and the earth*—was passed down through the generations by oral tradition. But it wasn't written down (as we know it) until the exile, hundreds, if not thousands of years later.

In the beginning, when there was nothing...God made something. In exile, even when all seems lost...God is making something. The rhythms of poetry of how life came to be found their cadence with the words of the prophets. "Comfort, O Comfort," speaks the prophet.

Amid destruction and loss, the prophet and the priestly writer contend that God cares for God's creation. From the beginning up to this moment. God is not finished. God will not give up on us. "Have you not known? Have you not heard? The Lord is the everlasting God, the Creator of the ends of the earth" (Isaiah 40:28).

Creation is a story worth holding onto. God is our hope.
